INTERNSHIP PROFILE Abby Koots

Hey everyone! I'm Abby, and I'm currently in my 4th (ish) year in the Faculty of Science. This past summer I had the privilege of completing my first Actuarial Internship with Great-West Life Assurance. I worked in the Asset Liability Management Valuation department, where most of our work surrounds performing cashflow testing, as part of the Canadian Asset Liability Method (CALM).

Every insurance company is required to follow CALM, to show solvency of their assets in various interest rate scenarios. The first half of my summer I spent most of my time producing surplus results for par insurance (insurance with dividends). I used an actuarial software, GGY Axis, in order to produce the surplus results for the various scenarios. With these results I was then able to create interest rate tracks, which were sent to various lines of business (LOB) in the company. These tracks ensure that the LOB discount their liabilities at the same rate the assets are earning.

The second half of the summer I worked on an Investment Expense Study. This is an annual study that ALM Valuation compiles to review the trend of investment expenses, and to ensure that the expense assumptions used in our cashflow testing are accurate. My contribution in this study mainly involved the use of Excel to compile and organize the data necessary in this study, and to translate the results of the study into an extensive Study Memo.

I found this experience to be extremely beneficial as an actuarial student, as a lot of emphasis was put on learning and understanding the process, not just on completing the work. Prior to my internship I had little experience with Excel, and no experience using GGY Axis. Everyone was very supportive in helping me learn the new software, and teaching me the meaning behind the processes we perform.

Of course, it wasn't all work; there were a lot of fun events throughout the summer as well! This was a particularly lucky summer to work at Great-West Life, as the actuarial interns were able to attend the LifeCo Actuarial Conference – which only happens in Winnipeg every 4 years. This was a great

opportunity to learn more about the company, the actuarial profession in general, and to meet other actuaries in the company. Besides the conference, there were many other actuarial/departmental events throughout the summer, including a historic walk in the Exchange district, disc-golfing, a trolley tour and of course the infamous Passer's Night (which all Winnipeg Actuaries can attend!)

I feel very fortunate to have had this opportunity, as I learned a lot (both technical and conceptual) and had a lot of fun while doing it. I have many valuable takeaways from this experience, with key ones being greatly improved computer skills, financial/actuarial knowledge, presentation skills, and first-hand knowledge that if you drop an egg from the 5th floor, it will break (after winning an egg drop competition at an actuarial event, we tested our contraption from the highest point in GWL – let's just say it's a good thing we're actuaries and not engineers).
